## POLICE ACCOUNTABILITY COALITION

Over 90 community based organizations in Winnipeg have come together to affirm their support for the Black Lives Matter Movement and a set of recommendations to achieve substantial change. They are adding their voices to growing calls from Black and Indigenous leaders for meaningful action to address police violence and systemic racism. Racial profiling and the disproportionate use of deadly force against Black and Indigenous community members have been compounded by the lack of community resources to address poverty, addictions, and mental health issues. Acknowledgements of systemic racism by government leaders and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) as well as the stated commitment to bias-free policing by the Winnipeg Police Service (WPS) must be accompanied by immediate and concrete actions to address long standing community concerns about police accountability and the allocation of resources. These actions must be undertaken through collaborative engagement with Black and Indigenous led organizations and the communities they represent.

"The matter of police accountability is not a new issue so we are frustrated by the lack of tangible action. The revolution has been televised, we have now organized, and are prepared to mobilize. Everyone's call for help should be answered promptly and by individuals who have both the skills needed to intervene in the situation and the compassion to do so respectfully." At 304 million for the Winnipeg Police Service and well over 2 billion a year in provincial Corrections alone, and we have still tragically seen a rise in violent crime, we have to ask ourselves: "What is our 'endgame'?
