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KEY FINDINGS

- An overwhelming majority of Manitobans particularly Winnipeggers, women and those in wealthier households – feel it would be hard for a family of four to make ends meet on \$30,000 per year. (That's the amount of funding provided by all levels of government to a family on social assistance in Manitoba.) Indeed, six-in-ten Manitobans feel it would be very difficult to live on this income, and even 43 per cent of Progressive Conservative supporters feel this way. Not surprisingly, those with high school or less and those in lower-income households are less likely to feel \$30,000 per year is insufficient for a family of four.
- A slightly smaller proportion about one-half feel the government ought to offer much more help to those living in poverty as part of the COVID-19 recovery. Here again, women and Winnipeggers are more likely to feel much more help is due to those in poverty following the pandemic, but younger adults and Indigenous people are also more likely to feel this way.
- More job training and more affordable housing are broadly seen as the most effective solutions to poverty. More than one-half of Manitobans rank these solutions in their top three. Interestingly, there is very little support for increasing welfare rates – only nine per cent of Manitobans favour this as an option. However, there is intense support among one-quarter of Manitobans for the creation of a guaranteed annual income.

ABOUT THE PROBE RESEARCH OMNIBUS

For more than two decades, Probe Research Inc. has undertaken quarterly omnibus surveys of random and representative samples of Manitoba adults. These scientific telephone surveys have provided strategic and proprietary insights to hundreds of public, private and not-for-profit clients on a range of social, cultural and public policy topics. The Probe Research Omnibus Survey is the province's largest and most trusted general population survey.

SURVEY INSTRUMENT

The survey instrument was designed by Probe Research in close consultation with the Social Planning Council of Winnipeg.


METHODOLOGY

- Between November 24th and December 4th, 2020, Probe Research surveyed a random and representative sampling of 1,000 adults residing in Manitoba.
- With a sample of 1,000, one can say with 95 percent certainty that the results are within ± 3.1 percentage points of what they would have been if the entire adult population of Manitoba had been surveyed. The margin of error is higher within each of the survey's population sub-groups.
- Modified random digit dialing, including both landline and wireless numbers, ensured all Manitoba adults had an equal opportunity to participate in this Probe Research survey. A CATI-to-web approach was employed whereby a live-voice operator randomly recruited respondents by telephone, inviting them to complete the survey via a secure online questionnaire. In addition, 277 randomly recruited Probe Research panel members were included in this general population adult sampling.
- Minor statistical weighting has been applied to this sample to ensure that age and gender characteristics properly reflect known attributes of the province's population. All data analysis was performed using SPSS statistical analysis software.








% who favour much more help for people living in poverty, post-pandemic
