Six candidates pledge to support Basic Income

Would lead City Council in call for feds and province to end poverty

Six candidates for Mayor of Winnipeg have promised that, if elected, they will immediately introduce a resolution at City Council calling on the federal and provincial governments to adopt a Basic Income for all Canadians.

The six candidates — Robert-Falcon Ouellette, Rana Bokhari, Glen Murray, Idris Adelakun, Shaun Loney and Chris Clacio — also agreed that a Basic Income would save the City of Winnipeg millions of dollars in police, fire, and paramedic calls.

The six candidates responded to a questionnaire issued last week by Basic Income Manitoba. The other candidates did not respond, with no one expressing opposition.

"We welcome this support from six of the candidates who aspire to lead this city. It's one more indication that most Winnipeggers want all Canadians to live with dignity," said Sid Frankel, chair of Basic Income Manitoba and social work professor at the University of Manitoba.

Media reports and studies have shown that vulnerable populations, especially the poorest of the poor, are responsible for a disproportionate share of the costs borne by the city for police, fire, and paramedic calls, as well as higher health care, social services and other costs borne by other levels of government.¹

"We have heard all the candidates say they have plans to 'deal with' crime and homelessness. The real crime is that any Winnipeggers are homeless!" Frankel said.

"It's not the fault of these Winnipeggers that they have higher needs for emergency services. It's the predictable result of not allowing all Canadians to live with dignity," he said.

"Basic Income Manitoba believes all residents of Canada should have an unconditional and sufficient income to live a life with human dignity, equity and wellbeing. The City of Winnipeg would save millions of dollars a year, as would the health care system," Frankel said.

A study by Evelyn Forget, vice-chair of Basic Income Manitoba and Professor of Community Health Sciences at the University of Manitoba, showed that a Basic Income would reduce health care costs by a significant amount.

Forget based her conclusions on the Mincome pilot project conducted in Dauphin in the 1970s by the federal and Manitoba governments of the day.²

The pilot project showed a sharp decline in hospitalizations for mental health issues and injuries from accidents. The evidence showed the savings to the health care system of a Basic Income would be significant, Forget concluded.

All six candidates answered "Yes" to the following three questions:

Q. 1 — Do you agree that a Basic Income would save the City of Winnipeg millions of dollars a year?

Q. 2 — Do you support a Basic Income?

Q. 3 — Do you promise that, if elected, you will immediately introduce a resolution at City Council calling on the federal and provincial governments to adopt a Basic Income for all Canadians?
